



# 2022-2023 Highlights



The Travel Buddy Film won best film in the £350-1 million turnover category at the Smiley Charity Film Awards. Charlene and Luke, who starred in the film, accepted the award.

A monthly hard-copy newsletter is sent to members of MLMC providing advice and sharing member's stories, updates and activities.



## £53,840

Funding received to support our user-led research project "Pioneering Women".





From the National Lottery Community Fund to fund our Gig Buddy project for a further five years!





Delighted to have received the Charity Award 2023 for the Disability caregory. Jack Backwell, active member and former MLMC trustee, announced as a winner of the Learning Disability and Autism Leaders' List 2022.





### **Power Up**

We received £182,000 in income and paid members £18,000 through this fee earning enterprise.

We delivered:

- 33 consultations activities
- 20 research projects
- 41 inspections of residential care settings for the local authority
- 5 training workshops
- 13 easy read translations

Partners/clients included Mencap, Southend-on-sea Council, University of Sheffield, Open University, The Electoral Commission, University of Oxford, Raphael Samuel History Centre, and the National Institute for Health and Care Research.



## Champions

Ongoing campaigns: "Don't Lock Us Away" focuses on advocating for the provision of alternative high quality community care for those locked away in secure hospitals. Successes from the year include gaining support from local health trusts, working with other nationwide advocacy groups, and our Co-Chair of trustees being featured in Community Living Magazine.

"We Can't Wait" strives to address longstanding health inequalities by prioritising people with a learning disability on NHS waiting lists. We've successfully secured funding from the local authority to produce a campaign film and accessible materials to help healthcare professionals implement change.



### Self-Advocacy Groups

We ran 8 adult self-advocacy groups across Oxfordshire, and 6 young people's groups. In March we launched a new group in Bicester, and we hope to start one in Witney before the end of 2023.

We provided training sessions, and released an Easy Read workbook, supporting members to become stronger and more confident self advocates.

The groups discussed both local and international issues. The Women's Group engaged in 'craftivism' by knitting a blanket to show their support for women in the USA, after learning that in many places their right to an abortion had been revoked.



## **Gig Buddy**

This year Gig Buddy hosted 25 social events attended by 79 individuals. Events included a trip to Cotswold Wildlife Park, a boat trip down the Thames, and a wild party at Witney Music Festival!

Our monthly user-led nightclub continued to thrive and a record 117 people attended in December.

The year saw 28 active Gig Buddy pairs, 8 of which were peerbuddies, and the first volunteer training event for 3 years. Together, Gig Buddy pairs did activities such as attending Cher the Musical, head banging at live concerts, and going to a silent disco!



## **Travel Buddy**

- 23 people recieved 1:1 travel training through 126 supported travel journeys
- 36 members benefited from 98 companion journeys
- 162 members built their travel confidence and skills at 17 different workshops.

Workshop topics included how to get train passenger assistance, safe travel, & how to get disability rail and buses passes.

Funding from Great Western Railyway helped us produce and send easy read train travel guides to all members, and deliver intensive support to 6 members to travel the London Underground.



## **Computer Buddy**

This year the number of free devices provided to members hit over 100, with thanks to funding recieved from Oxford Community Foundation's Step Change Fund.

63 members recieved support in the form of 1:1 sessions or group workshops. As a result, members have reported improved wellbeing and improved relationships with services, such as the NHS.

Key links have been made with organisations such as Guideposts, in addition to Oxfordshire day centres and the NHS Occcupational Health teams to maximise the project's reach.


